In the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Semester of History Hons and 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup>, 5th and 6<sup>th</sup> Semesters of History Programme of CBCS syllabus SEC Papers 302 & 401 are practical papers based on Projects. The two papers which our department teaches is An Introduction to Indian Art and Architecture and the other being Museum Studies. In the academic session of 2021-22 there were 49 Hons students and 06 Programme students in 3<sup>rd</sup> Semester and 49 Hons students and 06 Programme students in 4<sup>th</sup> Semester taking these papers. 

### REPORT OF PROJECT WORK

Project work is a compulsory course in the curriculum of all the 1st sem students of AECC 1. The outbreak of covid-19 pandemic and its continuing situation has changed the entire mode of education system. Field work is no exception. Due to this situation Department of ENVS could not make any organized field work. The students have collected data as per direction of syllabus from their nearby areas. They have taken both face-to-face interview and telephonic interview as per their convenience. All students have done their field work. They worked on the topic chosen by the teachers. They visited certain sites in Siliguri and the surrounding areas to identify the forest management procedure and learn how the sustainable forest management work in surrounding areas. They interacted with local authorities, forest villagers who live in the riparian area, and held a focus group discussion with them about the issue. The students also did field visit nearby Siliguri areas like Mahananda wildlife sanctuary, Baikanthapur forest and identified the procedure and techniques for better sustainable forest management and how the local birds associated with the region to maintain biodiversity.

Course Objectives:

This paper aims to equip students with empirical field data collection, analysis and writing analytical—and standard dissertation or research report writing in sociology. For the purpose of data collection—students require to undertake a field visit of neighbouring /area/ village/ town individually or in a group for 10 days. Students must conduct survey of at least 30 households (for individual independent—research) and adequate sample of households in case of survey in a group (Household Census to be—provided by the provided by the Department). The interview schedule (Interview Schedule to be attached—in the appendix) be prepared under the supervision of departmental faculty. The dissertation would be approximately 30 pages. The same pattern of dissertation be followed in every college.

### Evaluation of Dissertation:

Dissertation required to be evaluated by one internal and one external teacher appointed by the UG Board of Studies in sociology. For uniform evaluation of dissertation the following guildines / structure have been prescribed:

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# **Dept. of Sociology**



Field work is an integral part of curriculum of Honours Course of Department of Sociology. Field work for the students of sixth semester was done in word number 34 of Siliguri Municipal Corporation. The area is situated in the district of Jalpaiguri. The syllabus was truncated. Duration of this semester was only four months from March to June. It was the effect of pandemic. Field work was no exception. Due to shortage of time the Department of Sociology conducted field work for 6 days as there was no specific guideline in the truncated syllabus. Duration of field work was 6 days from 25th April to 30th April, 2022. All students of six semester (70) did field work. Students selected topics like gender role, migration, nature of changes in socialization process, educational and occupational mobility, family planning, socio- economic conditions of toto-drivers, emancipation of women, impact of pandemic on students, mid-day meal, kanyasree, superstitions, impact of social media on students etc for their dissertation paper. The local people co-operated a lot with the students and the field work accomplished a desired result.
